Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton | Easter 2024

"So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them, and they said nothing to anyone for they were afraid." That's where the Gospel of Mark originally ended. And it just seems so odd to me. It's so abrupt. I mean, the women had seen the angel. He'd announced that Jesus was raised from the dead, and then he tells them all this good news and wants them to go on their way. And they just are not going to say a single word.

There are three words in that passage that really stand out for me, especially in the Greek. One is fear — *phobos*. We get phobia from that. The other one is amazement — *ekstasis*. We get ecstasy from that. And the other one has to do with being seized. It actually means "being possessed." So we take a look at these women, and they've had this miraculous appearance by an angel. They've heard the good news that Jesus has raised from the dead, and they're too afraid to do anything about it, and they just are going to be silent. It seems that nothing changed. They came to take care of Jesus' dead body because on the Sabbath they could not work. But on the first day of the week, they were there. They have this announcement, and then it's all the same.

Sometimes I think we feel like nothing's changed. Sometimes I think that the events in our country, in our church, around the world are just so terrifying and so overwhelming that it seems like the resurrection really didn't make a difference. But these three words really say something about the women, and I think about us and, most especially, about Easter. When they said that they were filled with amazement — this is this ecstasy, *ekstasis* — they were really standing. It means literally standing in a different place. So though they were still in the tomb and they hadn't reacted yet, nevertheless, everything had changed. And because of the resurrection, we, all of us, are standing in a different place. The whole of creation is standing in a different place. And the word for fear, *phobos*, phobia we get from that. But it's really a sense of trembling in the presence of God, of awe that they were actually filled with awe — not paralyzed by fear but filled with awe. And I hope this Eastertide and all year round, we have a sense of the presence of God that fills us with awe.

And it also says that they were seized with fear. Well, the word means "possessed." And yes, we believe that in baptism because of the resurrection, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit and we now are all Spirit-possessed.


When things seem to be staying the same, when things seem to be happening and coming at us so quickly, I think it's very important to take time to be a little amazed, to be standing in a different place, to have a sense of this awe and trembling before the Lord, and to allow ourselves to be possessed by the Spirit, who will give us power and courage in these times.

My favorite hymn is "Lord Jesus, You Shall Be My Song." It's *ELW* 808. And the last verse goes like this: "I fear in the dark and the doubt of my journey; but courage will come with the sound of his steps by my side. And with all of the family Jesus saved by his love, we'll sing to his dawn at the end of our journey."

Be well, dear church. Happy Easter.

God is saying to you today.. stay strong, I am your strength. I see what you're dealing with and I will bring you through. Trust me through each storm, I have never left you before and I won't leave you now. Better days are coming. Trust me.

This month we spotlight Amanda Wiesehan






Good Morning Prayer







Living Hope Ministries in Haiti January-February 2024 Newsletter



The LHM 2023 Annual Report

Just when you think Haiti has had enough, the situation worsens: increase in gang wars, road blockages, continual political unrest,

and instability. Our fuel: gas, diesel, and propane is almost out. We have food shortages and limited access to go anywhere. Our entire area is blocked; the only way in and out is by foot, generally walking with hands above your head in front of the gangs with their weapons pulled. We have a couple brave people that go and get us supplies as locally as possible and usually hand carry them in.

They have said that over 150,000 Haitians have left the country this year on the Biden program. For example, the general hospital in Port-au-Prince has published that over 80% of their employees have left. Banks stated that over 40% of their employees have left. It seems that every office and business in Haiti has lost vital personnel.

Zion Church – Haiti

We continue to use homemade hand sanitizer and assure a safe and healthy distancing of the children in the church services. Actually, this even helps to keep the misbehaving to a minimum! During the summer (and times when school can't function), our attendance drops to 100-200. When school is in session, we have 200-300+ weekly in Sunday services.

The last 6 months of 2023 we felt it necessary to cancel Sunday school due to the gang activities in our area. We haven't been able to have any special events (such as the Christmas concerts, VBS, or Seminars) due to all the unrest and problems in our local area. We have church service at 8am and then have hospitality (bread, juice, or coffee). Many of the children and youth are hungry and need the bread and juice. Also, in the last 6 months of 2023, we held baptism classes after the church service. On Dec. 30th, we baptized 6 people as they confessed their faith in Jesus Christ. We also had a wedding and 2 child presentations in 2023.

The choir was functioning well, but the last 6 months, we had to place it on hold since it was too dangerous for the choir director to be here and try to head home through the gang areas.

We have had 2 adults accept Jesus as their Lord and Savior this year. Several others have returned to faith and have begun to attend church here.

We continue the twice-weekly interactive Bible Studies with 20-30 people of all ages in attendance. We have had to change the times to 3 or 3:30 pm so people can get home before dark safely.

The women's group has between 12-18 members and meets on Wednesdays at 3 or 3:30 PM. The women's co-op continues to enable each woman to have a business or grow an existing business. We continue to study the women of the Bible. We see many women of the Bible either start out bad and turn their lives around, or start well and end bad. So, we are trying to learn from their stories and nurture healthy, growing relationships with the Lord Jesus Christ.

We have continued to assist many people and members with funds for medicines, Dr. visits, education, food, and housing, etc. The need has increased even more with the rising prices and lack of access to many things.

We have been assisting 12 youth in higher education in high school and university.

Primary School

The 2023-24 school year has already been a tough year for students, families, and staff. Due to the increase of local gang activity and barricades, some families have left the area for safety. Others, depending on the daily situation, decide whether or not to send their students. Also, we have had to close the school periodically due to local unrest and problems. The political instability has motivated some families to leave our area due to it being a hot spot.

All the 2nd second graders are in music classes with recorders, and they love it. The 3rd graders then choose either 2nd year Recorder or 1st year Embroidery. These classes are being held during their regular school day. Both classes operate at the same time for 2- 3 hours once a week. We see the students learning and

advancing.

Besides the regular academics, we continue the practical hands-on classes: 1st grade – paper art; 2nd grade – plastic canvas lacing; 3rd grade girls – basic sewing; boys – shop with wood; 4th grade – cooking; 5th grade – crochet; and 6th grade – string art. Mary Jane teaches the crochet and shop classes weekly and fills in as needed on the other classes.

All 4th graders go into the afternoon trade school classes or Saturday music classes. Of course, drum and violin are the most popular music classes with the 4th graders. Sewing and cooking are the most popular with the 4th graders in the trade school.

Berline, the school director, flew to the USA to visit family and vacation for a period of time. Her trip to the airport went through several different gang areas; she often had to walk in front of armed gangs.

Trade School

All the trade school classes have opened on time, but we are forced to have shorter days due to students traveling in to come to classes. Some are unable to safely make it to their classes. We have 6 Sewing and Tailoring classes, 2 Embroidery classes, 2 Welding & Ironwork classes, 3 Cooking & Baking classes, 3 Business classes, and 1 Technique Design class for all 2nd year students. All music classes are offered for 3 years: Keyboard, Guitar (Ukulele, Classic, and Bass), Drums & Percussion, Violin, Saxophone, Clarinet, and Trumpet.

Again, our students did an excellent job in their governmental exams. Many of our graduates and current students have already found positions in their trades or are creating their own businesses. It is really exciting to be a part of their progress and success

We have 15 graduate students teaching in the trade school. All office staff are graduates of the trade school. Also, Mary Jane & Abukuk have been working together to update and improve the music curriculums. Andris still teaches as needed in the welding, cooking, and other classes, including math, geometry, and other basic life skills. And he oversees the entire mission. Mary Jane continues to teach as needed in the cooking and embroidery classes and works in administration.

Other things

The 1st of Dec., sister Cam from Mariani 4 walked in with her 3 live-in staff and orphanage children (18) ranging from 3 to 26 yrs. old. They were forced leave to find somewhere to safely stay while their area was being evacuated due to lots of gang activity. We immediately put them up and cleaned up the guesthouse for them to use during this difficult time for them. They have adapted well, and our staff has been helping out with preparing food for them 3 times a day.

Major Improvements

We added a primary school cement sidewalk and place for the students to stand for flag ceremony instead of the muddy paths and areas. We finished the mission perimeter wall. Wow! It really changed the appearance of the entrance of the mission. We also constructed the Gathering Center, and what a blessing it truly is! It is used for the primary school cafeteria;,the waiting area for parents, for the office, and students waiting for their classes. It is also the place for trade school devotions, Bible Studies, and womens' meetings, etc.

Upcoming Activities and Teams

We will receive visitors again as soon as the country in safe and more stable. We have had no visitors in 2023 due to the insecurity.

Future Construction Plans/Ideas

As soon as the local area improves we will begin the "Bridging the Community" project with the startup funds we have receive for the 1st phase of this much needed project.

Our dream projects are to construct a small library and cyber space for our students and those is the community. There are none available within 5-7 miles. We would try to stock it with books in French, Creole, and English. We would have internet hook-up and some computers on site for research and homework, with 1-2 printers present. This would be a place for the local students of all ages to come and do research and study with lights, tables, and chairs present. We would staff the library, and there would be strict rules for participating in the library center and loaning books out. Also, eventually, we would like to construct a science lab building and a computer lab for our primary students. We would also like to run double sessions of trade school classes: one in the mornings and one in the afternoons.

Please continue to pray for the students and staff of LHM for safety, protection, provisions, and that they can continue their education without fear and interruptions. We cherish your prayers for strength, favor, and endurance for Andris, Mary Jane, and the staff of LHM. Please also pray for the safety and protection of the Prime Minister and the people of Haiti. Pray for the forgiveness of the leaders, gangs, and all people in Haiti, and that God will change the situation of Haiti in His way and will.



"In Flanders Fields"

After World War I, the poppy flourished in Europe. Scientists attributed the growth to soils in France and Belgium becoming enriched with lime from the rubble left by the war. The red poppy came to symbolize the blood shed by those who fought and those who continue to fight for our country following the publication of the wartime poem "In Flanders Fields." The poem was written by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, M.D. while serving on the front line in World War I, to honor soldiers killed in battle.
